THE GIVING SEASON

The last quarter of the year marks the time when we are asked to dig deep in our pockets and give to several charitable efforts in the Poppleton Community that support children and families in need during the holidays.

ANGEL TREE

17 years ago, the late Elder Paul Alexander, who was deeply passionate about ministering to incarcerated men, introduced Carter Memorial Church to the Prison Fellowship Ministry. After weekly bible study visits to the prison, Elder Alexander spoke to men who struggled with not being present daily in the lives of their children and spouses and particularly, unable to provide gifts for their families at Christmas. He witnessed, first hand, the effects of systematic incarceration which strained family ties to the breaking point. Our Angel Tree "Happy Birthday Jesus" Celebration Dinner opened the door for countless elders, ministers, missionaries and lay members to share the love of Christ tangibly and strengthen family bonds, delivering personalized gifts and the Gospel to children on behalf of their incarcerated parent. In addition, every angel tree family received a free and easy-to-read Bible in English or Spanish. 2020 marked the 1st Virtual Angel Tree Celebration, allowing our efforts to continue on a different platform. Since 2003, through your generous donations, 510 families in the Southwest Baltimore region representing 3,060 children have been recipients of your gracious gifts.

PROJECT HARVEST

Recognizing an increased need between Thanksgiving and Christmas to provide perishable and non-perishable food items to families in our community, Project Harvest was birthed as an extension of the food pantry ministry nearly 20 years ago. Countless donations along with Maryland Food Bank and local groceries have provided generous meals for 1,750 families. Project Harvest Day- the 2nd Sunday in December-culminates with families gathering to hear a message of God's love, receive food baskets and enjoy a coffee and danish fellowship following service. In 2020, 100 families were served in Poppleton including Hollins House, Vintage Gardens, Mt. Claire Overlook and our community partner, James McHenry Elementary Middle School.

HOPE FOR THE HOMELESS: COAT & TOILETRIES DRIVE

"Watching homeless people huddle together to flee the bitter cold is painfully disturbing." This quote made a significant impact on one of our members who then opened and emptied his coat closet to share warmth, a bagged lunch and a message of inspiration. Each year, the evangelism ministry coordinates this effort which includes donations of new or gently used coats, blankets, hats, gloves, socks & toiletries and then distributes these items to the homeless population mid-December.

CARTER MEMORIAL HISTORICAL SPOTLIGHT

Sister Verria Powell has been a member of Carter Memorial Church of God in Christ (COGIC), formerly know as Carter's Temple COGIC, since birth. Sister Powell is one of sixteen children born to Evangelist Rosa Lee Lewis, a godly example to her children, a woman of prayer and faithfully committed to ministry. Sister Powell observed how her mother served in ministry while raising her children, which ultimately led her to have a mind for ministry and being a servant. Sister Powell is an humble, soft

spoken woman with a gentle spirit, but also strong and firm in her convictions when it comes to the work of the Lord. Sister Powell has many fond memories of Carter Memorial in the years she has been a member, and was asked to share a few.

Sister Powell remembers the Late Bishop Frank J. Ellis, former Pastor of Carter Memorial. "I was blessed to be Bishop Ellis' Secretary. He was a very kind-hearted man and would not allow you to do something that he himself would not do. When Bishop Ellis became ill, I became his nurse, and found it an honor to assist his wife, Mother Patricia Ellis, to care for her husband. Bishop and Mother Ellis considered me as the 'daughter they never had.' I had other duties as well that included peeling potatoes for the church dinner, working in the kitchen or where ever help was needed.

When asked to recall a sermon preached by Bishop Carl Pierce, Sr., that tremendously impacted her life, it didn't take long for Sister Powell to respond. "It was November 4, 2004, and the topic was 'Faith...Stay Focused, the enemy wants your mind. You can't have dysfunctional faith if you walk in Victory." Sis Powell also shared words of encouragement to potential members considering joining Carter Memorial Church, "Listen to the man of God, take notes during sermons, go home and study the notes, apply the word to your life and read not only the scripture given, but read the entire verse referenced in the scripture text given. Finally, live the life that is being preached. If you're ever given the opportunity to help or assist the man of God don't take it for granted. Take it very seriously and learn from the experience. Be Honest and True to your assignment."


